

Gwanda district-based film maker and director, stage producer and actor, Kukhanyakwenkosi Theophilus Zinti Mnkandhla aka Ganjah is an apt definition of passion, resilience and determination in single frame. A product of the Zimbabwe Film and Television School of Southern Africa (ZIFTESSA), Ganjah's passionate and seemingly insatiable appetite for the arts can be traced back to Mtshingwe Primary school, when he was yet achild.

"I grew up in a family where storytelling was some communion. We used to tell and re-enact stories, and I still vividly remember the lines I said in my first play at Mtshingwe Primary school, Ndabva pano mvenge North Africa", says the arts go-getter apparently owing most of it to the Simon Mambazo Phiri who directed SIYAYA arts ensemble. "SIYAYA is one of the arts organisations that inspired me to get into the arts industry, and so far, it has been good. The arts group used to visit my school for workshops and presentations

on art and the arts industry and stimulated most of our works at the Umzingwane drama", adds the artist whose greatest influence for the love of arts is also drawn from the environment where he grew up. From the face of it, he is arguably a positive consequence of observation, for he says, looking around the world, he realised there is a lot to tell, including so many stories out there that people need to know about and this is why he chose film and stageworks.

Added to enjoying the process of writing, Ganjah also delights in performing in front of a live audience as he says this gives him that immediate fulfilment from the audience' reaction.

"I was injured on the 13th of April 2000 when I was hit by a bus at the terminus here in Gwanda. Well, some may call this a curse but for me, it might be considered as a blessing. My closest friends always tell me they often forget that I am disabled", says the artist who believes he has managed to overcome calamity through great fortitude, strength of spirit and self-confidence

The artist who was left with no option but to learn to adjust early because he says he is an outgoing person, linking with people convincing them to see and not to judge a book by its cover, has enjoyed the academic and creative challenge in the arts and entertainment sector.

He describes that academically when putting down a production one needs to be sure about what they are taking out there. Creatively, this must be put in a special way so that it is relevant, people can remember you and this also must pay vou. Ganjah has also enjoyed the processes of challenging his mind about a new production. For him, writing is akin to being pregnant where the pregnancy is the idea, the growth, gestation period being the development of that idea and the birth being the culmination of the story be it on film or on stage, and that is what he enjoys.



He says he tries to find an angle that is unique from what has been done before and probably set a trend of what will come after, hence he says this is how his art is different from that by others in his same field of focus. Ganjah has arguably travelled miles in exhibiting




his art. He has performed at Sibikwa Arts Centre in South Africa, at Intwasa arts festivals and at many more festivals throughout the country. He says he wishes to capture the world as he is looking for platforms far and wide that will exhibit his films and stories. He is currently in the middle of writing a book where he is exploring ways to reach more people and at the same time, optimistic and closely monitoring how far this will get him. Ganjah also looks forward to advancing himself in both film and stage categories. He believes that there is great need for mainstreaming of the creative and cultural industries into a vibrant participation. As an actor, the greatest local achievement that Ganjah has received is when he was

part of a production called 1983: The Dark Years by the Jahunda Community Arts written by Bhekumusa Moyo which was nominated as the best theatre production at the 2019 National Arts Merit Awards, NAMAs. As an audio visual advertiser one of his advert came second in the Sahwira Where and Where competition organised by the Nyaradzo Funeral Services Group.

As a filmmaker Ganjah won a student filmmaking competition for a production called Homecoming which voted the best in Southern Africa among the film schools in the region. Ganjah is currently working on a book, a collection of stories called 58/19, this was his prison number when he got arrested for some reasons. He explains that the book features a lot of morbid stories, he wrote some of them while he was in a dark space and he is trying to maintain that dark theme. The book has stories about the war, the aftermath of the war, abuse in homes, stories about growing up from ekasi and he mentions that there is a lot of poetry too.

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

most people would like to refer to those without a disability. He says that his condition is just a limitation that does not enable him to do everything he wishes to do and is thank ful that he is able to do what he loves doing despite his condition.

"Just like anyone else, we all are not able to do everything, we are different in our abilities, but we can at least do something regardless of whether one has a disability or not", says Keith.

He has a mini studio though inadequately equipped with items he needs to fully focus on his works in the creative industry, he is proud to have a good starting point. Keith is thankful for the support

he receives from his family whom he says although he is not the only child, they do manage to assist him with the little that they have so that he can keep on keeping on, pushing his line of passion. Most of his productions he does from the comfort of his home where he is mostly seen on his bed working on a laptop. Dj Rixx says it is difficult for people with a disability to be successful partly due to the stigma, misconceptions and myths around the whole subject of disability. He also mentions that due to the unfavourable state of the economy in the country. there is a challenge when it

Inequality is the struggle for many PWDs as they encounter it from birth to death.

Keith believes that he will be able to deliver quality products for local and international market.

The high price for internet data is another factor that prohibits him from realizing his full potential as he is limited when it omes to partaining on digital platforms where internet data is a prerequisite. He is aware that he can be able to generate revenue from his art via digital platforms however, for now it is hard for him to get to the online stores.

"I do not have enough equipment to enable me to fully vork

"We partner, we do the work, we share the money, please do not oring grocery paper bags to me, I just need to work and be able to eat from my own sweat, do not be sympathetic at all about my condition, all I need is a partnership", he dislikes handouts.

Aspiring to be like Internationally renowned Black Coffee, Keith is a beneficiary of the Nkomwa Foundation Trust, NFT, an organization that promotes active participation of people with disabilities among other key duties and responsibilities of the organisation.

In 2021 Keith made an attempt at releasing a music project, unfortunately he could not find artists to collaborate with.

"Things are however starting to look well for me, since December 2021 I have managed to release 2 tracks, a drill song called Ndayi that I did with Lixxie and a song called Mudhara nhanzve, an amapiano/rap song featuring Lixie Lixxie and Leon Cia", adds an optimistic Keith.

His area of interest in drawing nature makes him stand out as unique especially considering that in the province he is one of the few who do this kind of art. Since art is broad with several distinguishing categories, he believes that it is important for one to focus on a particular area and do exceedingly well in order to produce fully baked projects.

Asked about what led him to focus specifically on nature in his drawings, he explains: "Imvelo ngabona kuyinto enhle emehlweni ami, drawing nature is one of the easiest tasks especially when you are good at mixing paints and you have a skilful way of using pencils. It's quite interesting and attractive especially with different colours".

Propelled by passion for art, the undeterred sketcher says he carries his pencil wherever he goes. As early as grade 3 while at Gwanda's Jahunda primary school, he already exhibited quality skills and an artful hand in everything he drew that included a giraffe, hare and tortoise. Physically but not mentally haunted by handicap having born with spina bifida (multiple



The former volunteer at the Nkomwa Foundation Trust (NFT) mentions some of the challenges he faces. These include limited art resources such as drawing material due to lack of funds, and a place where he can showcase or advertise his works.

Born With A Sight Condition, A Rainbow Psalmist With a Unique Foresight For Gospel Music.





"I am doing the modern gospel feel, the classic one whereas others tend to mainly focus on the traditional way of doing music even though my desires might take time to come to fruition", says the Gwanda born and bred Thembela.

A vocalist, vocal coach and songwriter, the visually impaired creative discovered his passion for music when he joined the school choir at grade 2. He later joined an Acapella group during his early years at high school which he describes as one of the best experiences as it accorded him the opportunity to realise his vocal prowess.

With a passion to minister and preach through gospel music, he mentions how his music approach is different from that of others when he says that he has chosen the contemporary way of doing music with a high consideration of the evolution of the industry. His hopes are to-

transform the music industry and is well aware that this might take him a long time for his desires to be fulfilled. The qualified social worker working with vulnerable groups, offering protection services among other services, mentions that his ability is stronger than his disability. In dire need of a mini studio, Thembela can play acoustic guitar and says he needs more training in this regard. He cites some of the challenges that he faces and these include financial constraints, limited

gospel music recognition and uptake. He also mentions that for now in his industry it is hard to make money as there is more money that one uses in order to release a song compared to the returns. He further bemoans the difficulties in accessing gigs or shows for performances of late since the industry had recently been completely shut down due to the Covid 19 p and emic.

Of note, the rainbow province's own version of a Psalmist has worked with different groups such as ZimPraise and Hybrid Psalms, and with whom he has recorded some songs.

For his solo career he has managed to work on three singles, mainly, Hallelujah, Ndichamirira and Nkosi.



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
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UNDISCOURAGED by physical disability, and well known in the creative industry as nktinashe, Tinashe is an upcoming hip hop artist based in Mbalabala. He ventured into the music industry in 2015 and he mentions that he is more interested and enjoys the writing part in music. Suffice to say, this area involves immense talent, skills and expertise in an individual where high commitment and dedication to pursue an assignment is highly sought, and from the look of things, Tinashe perfectly fits in that crop.

"I do hip hop trap, a stylish kind of sound which is more advanced but tapped from the traditional hip hop genre. It is a new school type of hip hop music that originates from the United States of America. I also enjoy watching comedies and talent shows such as the America's Got Talent and AGT", says the artist in great need of proper recording facilities and a music promoter.

The emerging artist acknowledges that he faces challenges in his music pursuit, but these do not at all hinder him from being productive as he aspires to be one of the most renowned hip hop trap musicians globally.

"I have never looked down on myself, I love myself the way I am and I live by the motto that I can do just anything that a so-called abled person can do. I pride in perseverance", says the artist who also longs for a recording encounter with renowned, Harare-based DJ Oskid.

Tinashe calls for publicity of his art, fortunately an area that the Creatives magazine is focusing on, talent publicity using digital podiums.

"It is very difficult for me to record and I have no one who can promote my music, I need recognition for possible opportunities in my music career," he adds.

Tinashe is thankful for the support he receives from his community where people appreciate his art and assist him here and there in acquiring skills related to music production. So far he has only managed to showcase his works in the community where he lives and on his social media accounts.

He hopes that one day his music will be played on local and international radio stations as long as he receives the much-needed assistance on how this is done, music marketing and promotion on radio.



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The T.I.M.E Project



The creative and cultural industry in Matabeleland South is well represented by various organisations that exist to fulfill several mandates that are key to the development and maintenance of the arts industry in the province.

Adrian "Drivo" Musa, the founder of the Time Entertainment Promotions organization that was established in 2019 and officially registered on the 25th of March 2022 is one of the renowned iconic figures locally and internationally. The organization is registered under the National Arts Council of Zimbabwe (NACZ) as a promoter of the cultural and creative industries.



One of the noteworthy projects offered under his invention is widely known as T.I.M.E Project, this is where their team energy, love, passion and zest for creativity is highly demonstrated. The T.I.M.E Project team has vastly and positively contributed to the creative industry in Matabeleland South and beyond. Drivo says that the organization is a mentorship and promotion initiative for local creative entrepreneurs within the creative and cultural industries in Matabeleland South. 
















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
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
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
